As some of you know, in my private devotions I often read posts from a Franciscan Priest by the name of Father Richard Rohr. Recently using information from another source, he indicated that the elements of our faith journey could be compared to a tricycle. The three wheels are tradition, Scripture, and experience. He doesn't indicate

which wheel is what, but my guess would be the front wheel with the peddles is the Scripture.

As we know, the scriptures are the foundation of our faith. As we try to live our faith, we continually need to look at the scriptures to gain an understanding of what it means to follow the teachings of Jesus, to be concerned about our neighbor, our family, our nation, and our world. The basic idea of loving our neighbor as much as we love ourselves comes from the teachings of Jesus. So, how informed are we about the scriptures? Do we practice daily readings? Do we participate in Bible studies? Is our learning about the teachings of the scriptures only coming from attending worship services? How do we keep that front wheel turning?

Tradition is how we are helped to live out those teachings. These include the traditions and teachings of the Lutheran church, as well as other denominations. It includes our worship style, how we teach the scriptures, the Holy days we observe, how we manage the functions of the congregation and how we share our faith with those around us. One of the things we do not like to admit is that traditions do change. When I was growing up, the tradition was you went to Sunday School at 9:00, Worship at 10:30, and then to grandpas for dinner. The tradition was fasting during Lent. The tradition was that no stores were open on Sundays. Then it became the tradition of two worship services on Sunday. Stores began to open on Sundays, and you know the rest of the story. So even though tradition is a very important part of the tricycle, it does something change.

The wheel of experience is how these other wheels impact our daily lives. How do we experience the other two? How do we share the other two? Does living the other two cause us to experience life differently than others. As we saw above, traditions change. As we experience these changes, how does this effect how we live our lives? How do we adapt. As we have different experiences will we see or make change? How adaptable are we to change? How do we experience what is going on around us? Because it is different than what we are used to, do we ignore it or try to shut it out? My experiences have a lot to say about who I am, and how I live my life.

We have been living in different times during the pandemic. Things have been different, that's for sure. We have had to worship strictly online, then outdoors, and now limited indoors, and maybe soon normal, whatever that is. Will this experience change how we do and experience worship in the future? Will our traditions change at all? Will our worship experiences change? How will a new Pastor influence our traditions? How open are we to change? We have been sharing our worship online. Will that continue? There are those who are saying it should because we have been reaching people outside of the church. So, I guess the question is, how are we going to be riding our tricycle into the future?



WITH TRUST IN THE LORD, THE WORK BEGAN

In 1928 Pastor Max Schleicher and a small group of friends banded together to build the first small cottage in a cornfield in Williston, Ohio. This home would provide care for people, then mostly children, who were living with developmental disabilities. In the late 1920's and early 1930's disabilities were poorly understood and often hidden within families. Yet, the need was there and the first cottage was quickly filled to capacity.

As the decades passed many more buildings were added to the Williston campus. Today, on this 25 acre site, Luther Home is licensed to provide round-the-clock care to 97 adults with intellectual and developmental disabilities.

In 1999 Luther Home also established community-based services. Today these services include affordable housing, in-home care and day habilitation programs. Operating in four Ohio counties, more than 200 people are served in these programs each day.

Much has changed and evolved since LHM's humble beginnings nearly 90 years ago. However, today, as it was in 1928, we remain true to our mission of service:

"We are a ministry Enriching Lives and Individual Abilities"


