Receiving hate, giving love

Many years ago, during Communism in Romania, my wife, Daniela, and I wanted to start a small clothing factor. The single person who could approve it was the president over all businesses in that county. We scheduled an appointment with him and presented our desire. Although we had all of the proper documents and passed all of the needed inspections, he refused to approve us. When I inquired why, he answered, "I hate you Christians, I cannot agree with you. You all should be destroyed."

For months, whatever we did was not sufficient, but eventually we were approved and started our business. When the revolution was over, there was no longer a Communist party. The man lost his position and went in desperate search of work. Most people hated the former Communist leaders, so few would open their doors, let alone hire him. One day, he came to our house.

As I opened the door, the man recognized me. He started to plead for a job, with no hope that he would get hired. The hurt and his hate were still fresh in our minds. Daniela and I looked at each other, then offered him a job on the spot. Our former antagonist was amazed. "Why would you help me when I hated you?" he asked incredulously.

"I cannot agree with your views," I answered. "But I do not hate you. In fact I care for you."

You don't have to agree

In Matthew 18, Peter tries to impress Jesus. "Should I forgive people seven times?" Jesus responds, "Seventy times seven" (v.22). That seems a little eccentric. Then Jesus tells of a servant who owed the king ten thousand talents. "Forgive Me," he says; "I'll pay it back." Right there, he missed it the depth of his sin and the breadth of God's grace. One talent was about 67 pounds of gold, about 16 years of wages.

One would need to live about two thousand lives to pay that amount of debt. On the other hand, the servant is consumed with anger and unable to forgive someone who owed him a hundred denarii - just three months' salary. The bad news is you can never pay your debt. The good news is you don't have to, Jesus paid it all.

Those who value Jesus' blood have no problem forgiving, loving, and showing grace. Turning one's back on this love and grace results in self-inflicted consequences. The third angel's message state, "'And they have no rest day or night, who worship the beast and his image, and whoever receives the mark of his name" (Rev. 14:11, NKJV). How should we react when we encounter persons who think or act differently from us?

Mark Finley states, "If your understanding of the mark of the beast makes you angry...[If it makes you] angry at the people who don't preach it like you think they ought to then you need to reexamine your heart. Your understanding of the mark of the beast should give you a passion for reaching lost people with the gospel of Christ. . . If my understanding of prophecy doesn't make me a more loving, kind, compassionate Christian - then I should reevaluate my understanding."

You do have to love

In a society where division and even hate have become more and more the norm, the third angel's message is ultimately a message of love. Even children may be taught that the proof of God's presence in one's live is the love of God manifested toward those who don't deserve it. Shama Stock states, "God's message of warning is a loud message of love. He wants to come into your heart and change you into his image."²

Jesus commands us to love one another to the same degree that He loves us (John 12:34). God is calling us to experience His love and reflect it to those around us - to the same degree that He has loved us. You cannot give what you don't have.

TRINITY CONGREGATION COUNCIL Meeting Highlights - July 15, 2021 - 7:00 pm

Attending: Carrie Wiedenheft, Sally Warner, Jim Bertsch, Candy Beatty, Pastor Ralph, Barb Wobser, and secretary, Carol Dahs. Not in Attendance: Mike Markley, Bonnie Lieb, Judy Driscoll

Meeting called to order by President, Carrie Wiedenheft

Opening devotions were given by Barb Wobser.

Minutes of previous meeting (June) were reviewed. Barb made a motion to accept the meeting minutes as submitted. 2nd by Candy. Motion was placed on hold because there was not a quorum for voting.

Treasurer's report for June was reviewed. Sally made a motion to accept the treasurer's report. 2nd by Candy. Motion was placed on hold because there was not a quorum for voting.

President's Report: Carrie submitted in writing a letter to Guy Miller and the Call Committee on Council's requirements for a pastor. Pastor Cathy suggested that council use the council liaison Barb Wobser for updates on the Call Committee actions. One new name was given for thought to the Call Committee, but they did not feel it was a good fit for Trinity, so they declined an interview.

Pastor's Report: Pastor Ralph requested that a couple more front doors be opened for worship service. This allows those who are unfamiliar with the building to be able to access it easier. Jim will open up more starting this Sunday.

Congregational Life – Candy Beatty – There were 60 people present for the church picnic after VBS on July 11. Everything went well with little food leftover.

Mission Service – Judy left a request that Trinity support a collection of personal care items to be collected through August to support God's Work Our Hands in September. We will continue to collect for Luther Home of Mercy also. The pork and kraut dinner will happen this year in November with it being carryout only.

Property – Mike Markley – Carrie reviewed a list of items from Mike who was unable to attend. Clearview Window Tinting will come out and install the impact protection film on the new educational doors after they are installed. A new heavy-duty door closer was installed on the south entry door. Approval for educational door replacement bid from Janotta and Herner was tabled until next month due to no quorum for voting. Mike was able to clean out the gutters.

Witness and Welcome – Bonnie Lieb – Sally reported for Bonnie that she made calls to past members and had good conversations with them about church being back open. Most seemed to be aware.

Worship and Music – Sally Warner – Sally stated that we will stay with two services currently. Prayer request cards and memorial envelopes were added to the south entrance to the sanctuary for everyone's convenience since items are not being placed back in the pews yet. Pastor Cathy will look into seeing if Trinity can find two representatives to attend the Synod Assembly. Trinity will go back to a full Sunday service after GWOH's Sunday on September 12. VBS had 22 kids present. Everything went well. Teachers and kids enjoyed the one-day event. Thank you's will be sent to Trevor Ramsdell and Koral Russell for their help.

Old Business – Council decided they did not want a special tab on our new website for just council meeting minutes. Carol reported that the new website looks good and is coming together. Trinity still needs to know how they can update it.

New Business – There was a transfer request from Dan and Lori Schlick to Zion, Sandusky. Carol stated that Brainiac's is available through Buckeye for \$90 per month. This would give us some tech support on all our computers that is currently needed. There is an additional \$80 on site charge if they need to come to the building. Carol will ask Adele about her son Brad helping Trinity get their new tablet figured out to record and upload our services each Sunday.

Why is SNAP Important?

- SNAP provides many with basic nutritional needs to get through temporary hard times.
 - In 2015, SNAP lifted 4.6 million Americans above the poverty line, including 366,000 seniors.
 - SNAP helps to ensure that seniors age with dignity.
- SNAP is absolutely critical to making sure no one in America goes hungry.
- COVID-19 Emergency Relief Bill-\$13 billion in increased funding for the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), which includes a 15 percent increase in the monthly benefit through June 2021. Nationally, four million older adults rely on SNAP benefits to meet their nutritional needs.





Am I Eligible?

- SNAP is targeted toward our most at-risk citizens, including elderly or disabled members.
- Federal eligibility for SNAP is limited to people with gross incomes up to 130% of the federal poverty line meaning a family of four can make no more than \$2,633 a month to receive benefits.
- The amount you receive will depend on your Household income from all sources, such as money you get from a job, Social Security, SSI, or interest. How many people live in your household.
